ARTIST PROFILES

Pamela Elrod Huffman's conducting career spans all levels – from elementary and secondary schools to university, symphonic, and church choirs – and has included positions in Texas, New York, Illinois, and Georgia. Since 2007, Dr. Huffman has served as the Director of Choral Activities at SMU's Meadows School of the Arts, where she oversees the MM Choral Conducting program and directs all of the university's choral ensembles.

An accomplished vocalist, Dr. Huffman has appeared as a guest artist with numerous university, professional, community and church choirs

throughout the country. From 1988 until 1999, she sang with the late Robert Shaw, performing and recording with the Robert Shaw Festival Singers, the Robert Shaw Choral Institutes, the Atlanta Symphony Orchestra Chorus, and the Atlanta Symphony Chamber Chorus. Since 2003, she has been a member of the Grammy Award-winning professional choral ensemble, Conspirare, under the direction of Craig Hella Johnson.

Dr. Huffman regularly serves as a choral clinician and adjudicator in Texas, as well as throughout the United States. In addition, she is a sought-after workshop clinician, particularly in the area of the choral techniques of Robert Shaw. Her article on Shaw's warm-ups can be found on the Singer Network website, and an article on Shaw's rehearsal techniques appears in the February 2013 issue of TMEA's professional journal, Southwestern Musician. Both resources can also be found on a website dedicated exclusively to the late conductor – robertshaw.website.

Dr. Huffman holds Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Music from the University of Texas at Austin and a D.M.A. in Choral Conducting from the University of Illinois, Champaign-Urbana. She is the current Past President of the Texas Choral Directors Association and also holds memberships in the Texas Music Educators Association, the American Choral Directors Association, the National Collegiate Choral Association, Chorus America, and Pi Kappa Lambda.

Originally from South Carolina, **Joshua Boyd** graduated from the University of Michigan in 2015 with a degree in organ performance. During his college years, he frequently performed with the University's Symphony Orchestra, University Philharmonia Orchestra, and University Choirs. His private instructors have been Dr. Marilyn Mason, Dr. Timothy Tikker, Dr. Karl Schrock, and Dr. James Kibbie. He has performed in many venues across the United States, including the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts as part of their Conservatory Project concert series, and The Basilica of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception. Joshua has been featured on the radio broadcast PIPEDREAMS (produced by American Public Media) in a recital given at Hill Auditorium in Ann Arbor, Ml. In May 2019, he received his Master's Degree in Organ Performance from Southern Methodist University and is currently pursuing a Performer's Diploma at SMU in the studio of Stefan Engels. After finishing a two year Organ Scholar position at the Church of the Incarnation he is now Organist and Choirmaster at St. Luke's Episcopal Church in Dallas.

Colleen Kilpatrick earned a Master of Music in Collaborative Piano from the University of North Texas in 2019 and a Bachelor of Arts in Music from Ave Maria University in 2016. While a student at UNT, she was the accompanist for University Singers and Women's Chorus, and served as staff accompanist and coach at AMU from 2016-2017. Ms. Kilpatrick was rehearsal pianist for *The Magic Flute* and keyboardist for *L'incoronazione di Poppea* at the Miami

Summer Music Festival in 2019, and formed Duo Floreciente in 2019 with soprano Amy Canchola. She has performed in masterclasses with Margo Garrett, Susan Youens, Margaret Singer, and Roy Howat, among others, and is a staff pianist at Southern Methodist University in Dallas. Ms. Kilpatrick loves to share her passion for the piano with students of all ages, and has been teaching privately since 2009. Also a trained organist, she has held several church positions in the Dallas-Fort Worth area and her native Southwest Florida.

Nicholas Lemon is a current second year student from Richardson, Texas. He is pursuing a degree in Music Education and Percussion Performance. Nicholas is currently a Drumline Technician at Richardson High School. In his off-time, Nicholas likes to stay active by playing Spikeball and Disc Golf. In the future, Nicholas hopes to be a percussion instructor in the DFW area, while still performing around the metroplex.
